

Veteran Centers, Scholarships, and Clubs: The Impact of Educational Common Components on Student Veterans' Success

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Study Background

- **Student Veteran characteristics:**
 - 70% of post-9/11 either have received or is working towards a degree/certificate (NVEST, 2017)
 - Older than traditional students (> 22) (IVMF, 2017)
 - Education is the top reason for joining the service majors: law, business, social work, & criminology (Heyden et al., 2014)

Study Rationale

- Barriers to completing an education:
 - Financing an education (lack of knowledge of financial aid availability) (NVEST, 2017)
 - Transferring credits (Mikelson & Saunders, 2013)
 - Feelings of isolation on campus and difficulty connecting with traditional students (Bonar, 2016; DiRamio, Ackerman, & Mitchell, 2008)

Presentation Aims

- Identify Veterans who completed degrees within the first 3 years after separating from active military service
- Describe utilization of scholarships, Veteran centers, organizations and school services
- Identify the components that related to completing their educational goals or withdrawing

Methods: Recruitment

- **Initial mail recruitment** of Veterans who separated in the past 90 days
 - Recruitment (Sept to Oct 2016) - census from VA Data Identity Repository of 48,965 Veterans who separated in past 3 months
 - Non-response survey weights based on gender, paygrade, and service branch
- **Follow-up web surveys** every six months for 3 years (last assessment May 2019)
 - Invitation by email, text, and mail

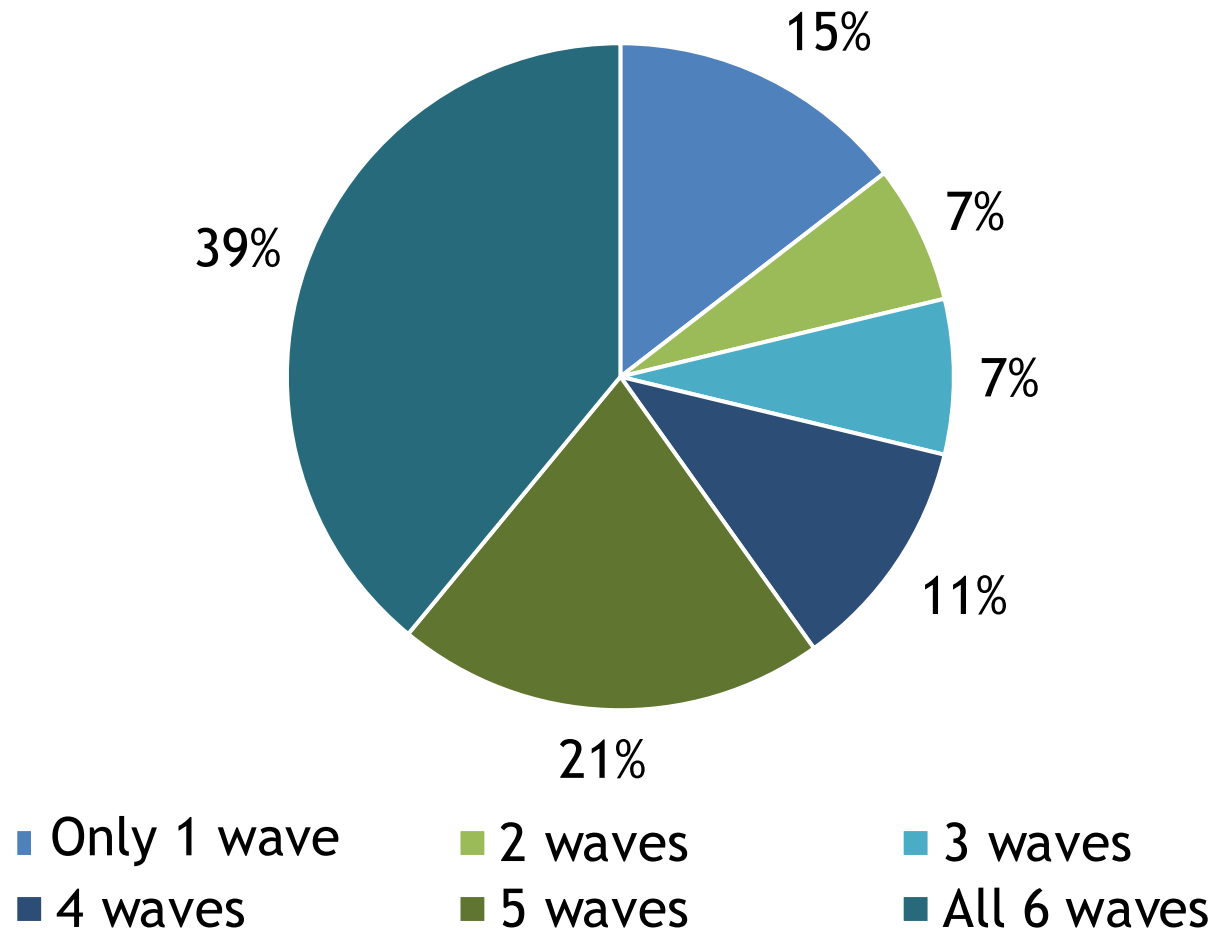


Incentives Increase Participation

- Robust incentives (Amazon gift codes) provided immediately after survey completion
 - \$25 at Wave 1 (October 2016)
 - \$50 at Wave 6 (May 2019)
 - Total of \$225 for all 6 waves
- Raffle of 10 additional \$100 Amazon giftcodes
 - Loyalty gift (magnet) and thank you letter sent after Wave 2 (July 2017)
 - \$100 gift codes x 10 winners x 6 waves

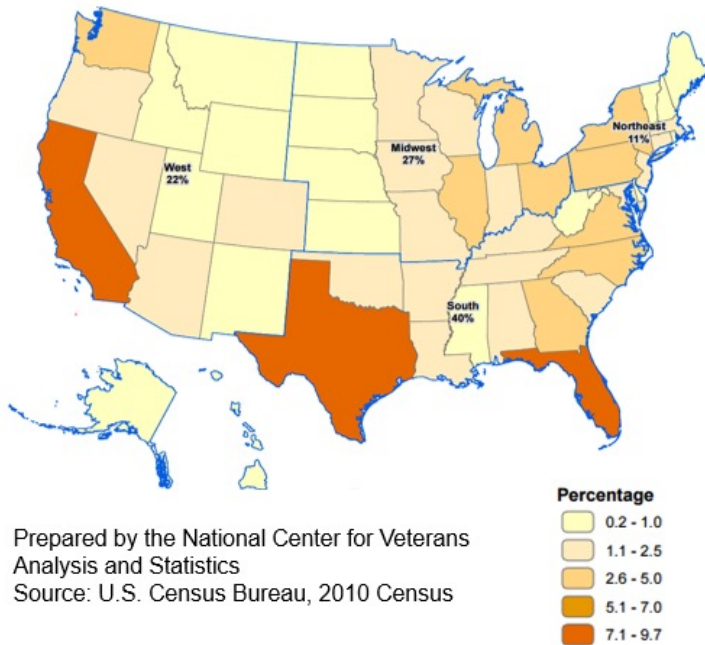


Cases Completing Baseline and Follow-Up

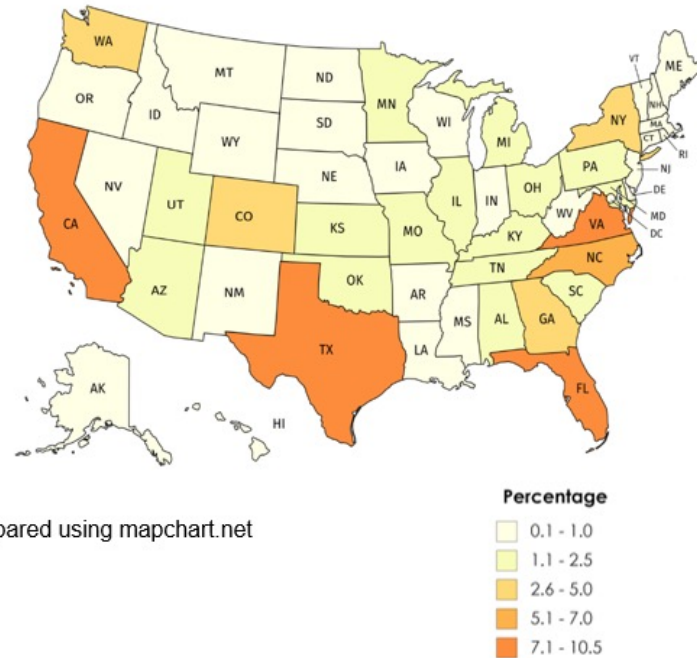


Where Veterans Live

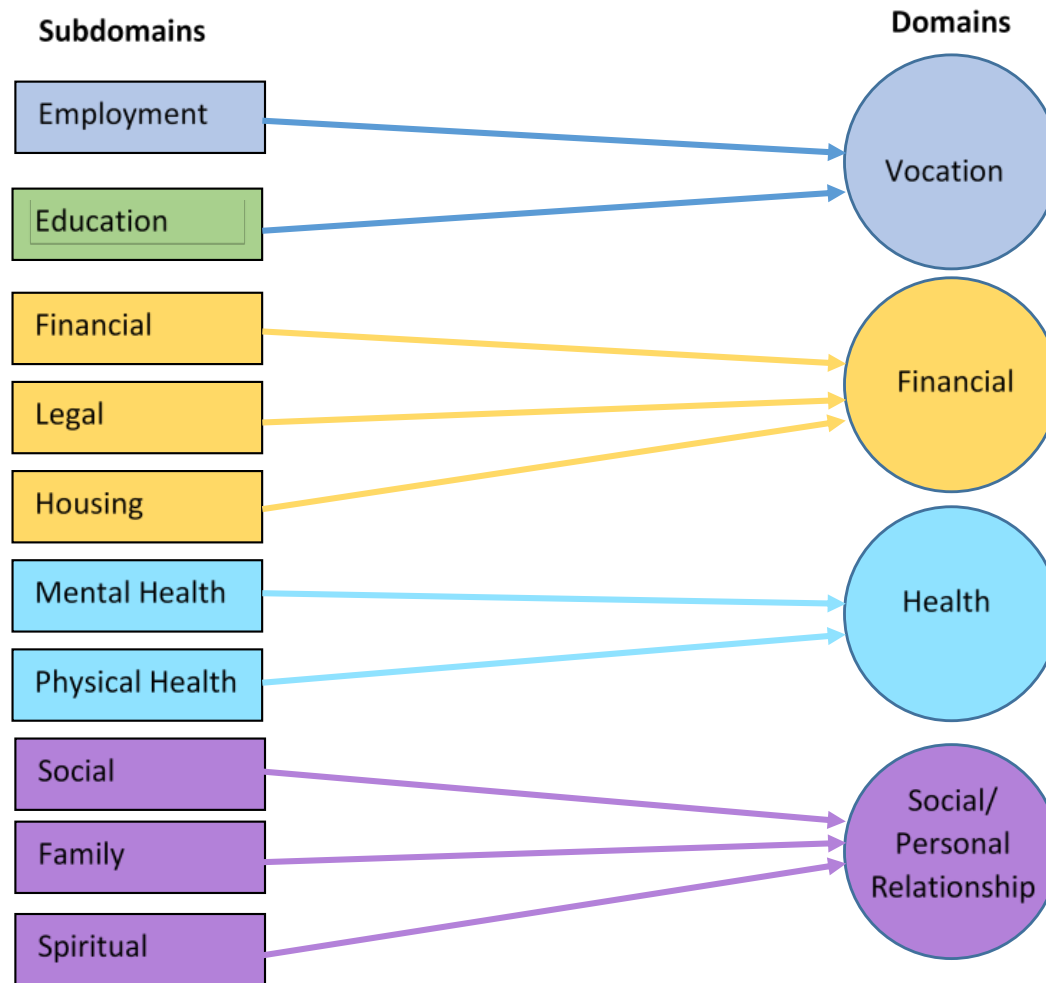
Percent of Total Veteran Population

Methods: Measures

- **Education:**
 - Highest level, currently engaged in full-time or part-time coursework (including technical training)
 - Name of school
 - Participation in Veterans center, Veterans organization, other student organizations
- **Other Covariates:**
 - Financial difficulties (Vogt, 2019)
 - Mental health symptoms (PTSD, depression, anxiety)
- **Outcomes:**
 - Completed education
 - Left school or training due to other possibilities and/or difficulties with grades, performance
 - Social engagement

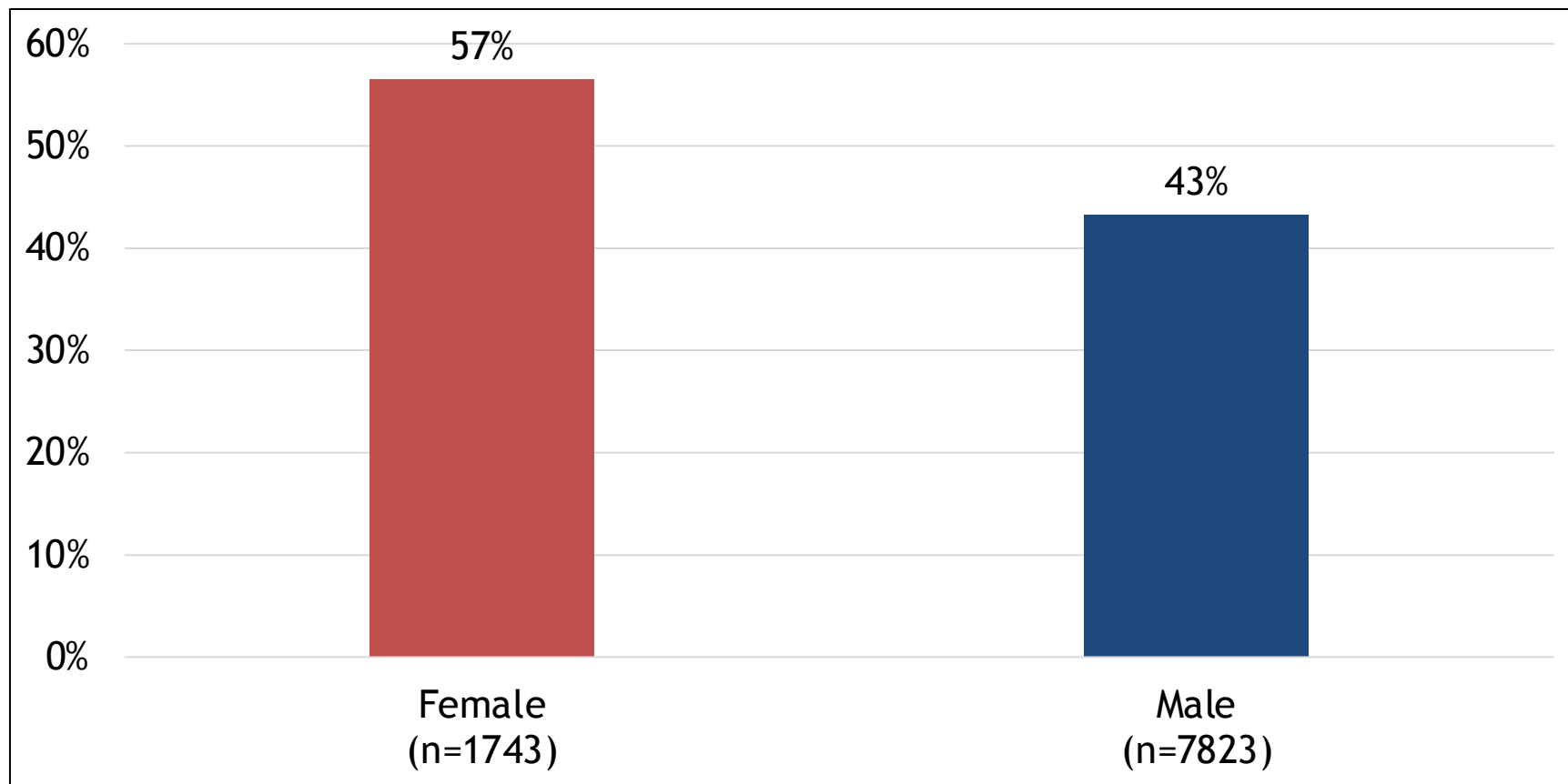
Who attends education or training within the first 3 years after discharge?

Background on Education Data

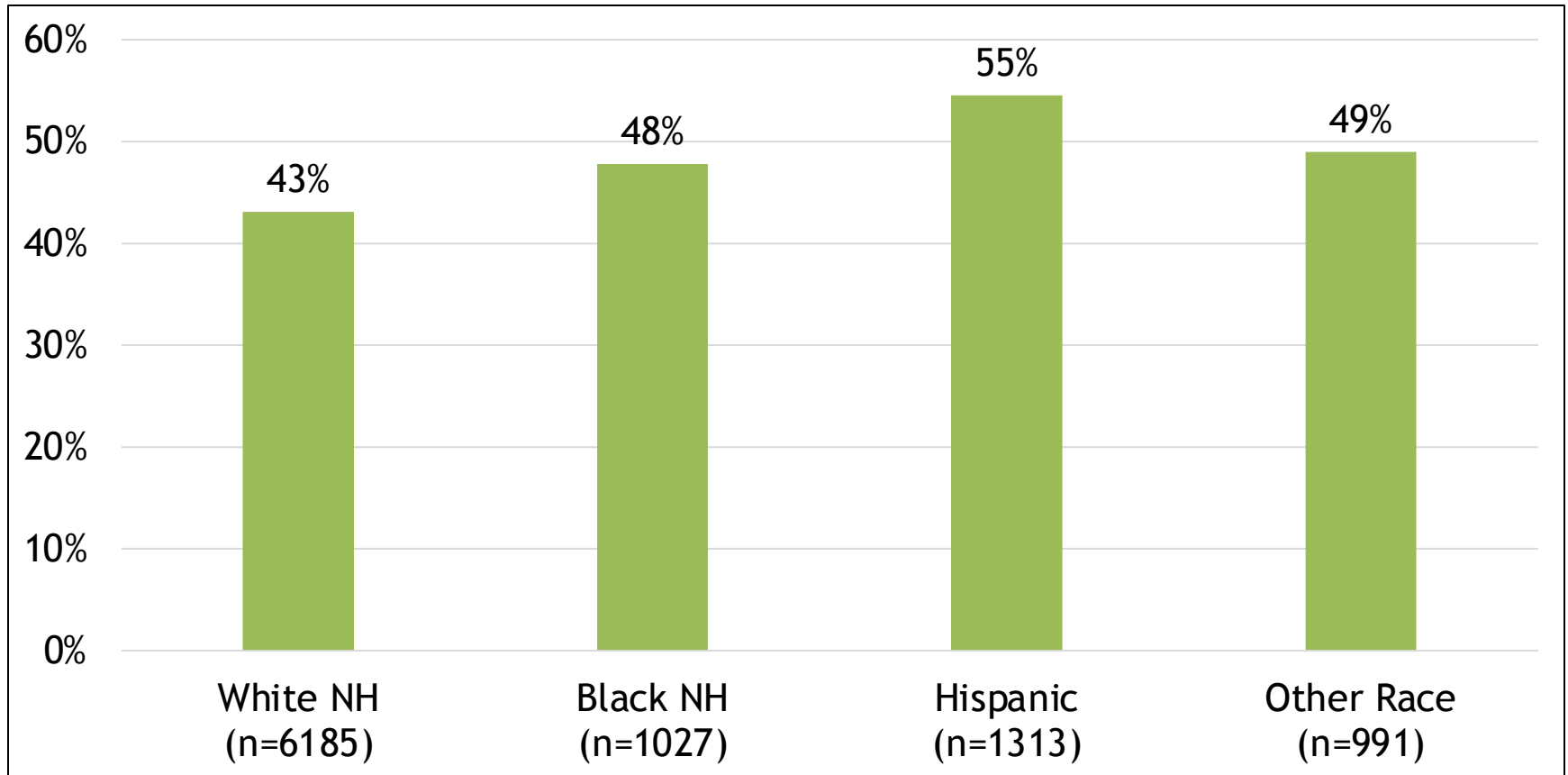
- Across all 6 waves of data, approximately 46% of all Veterans went on to some continuing training or education



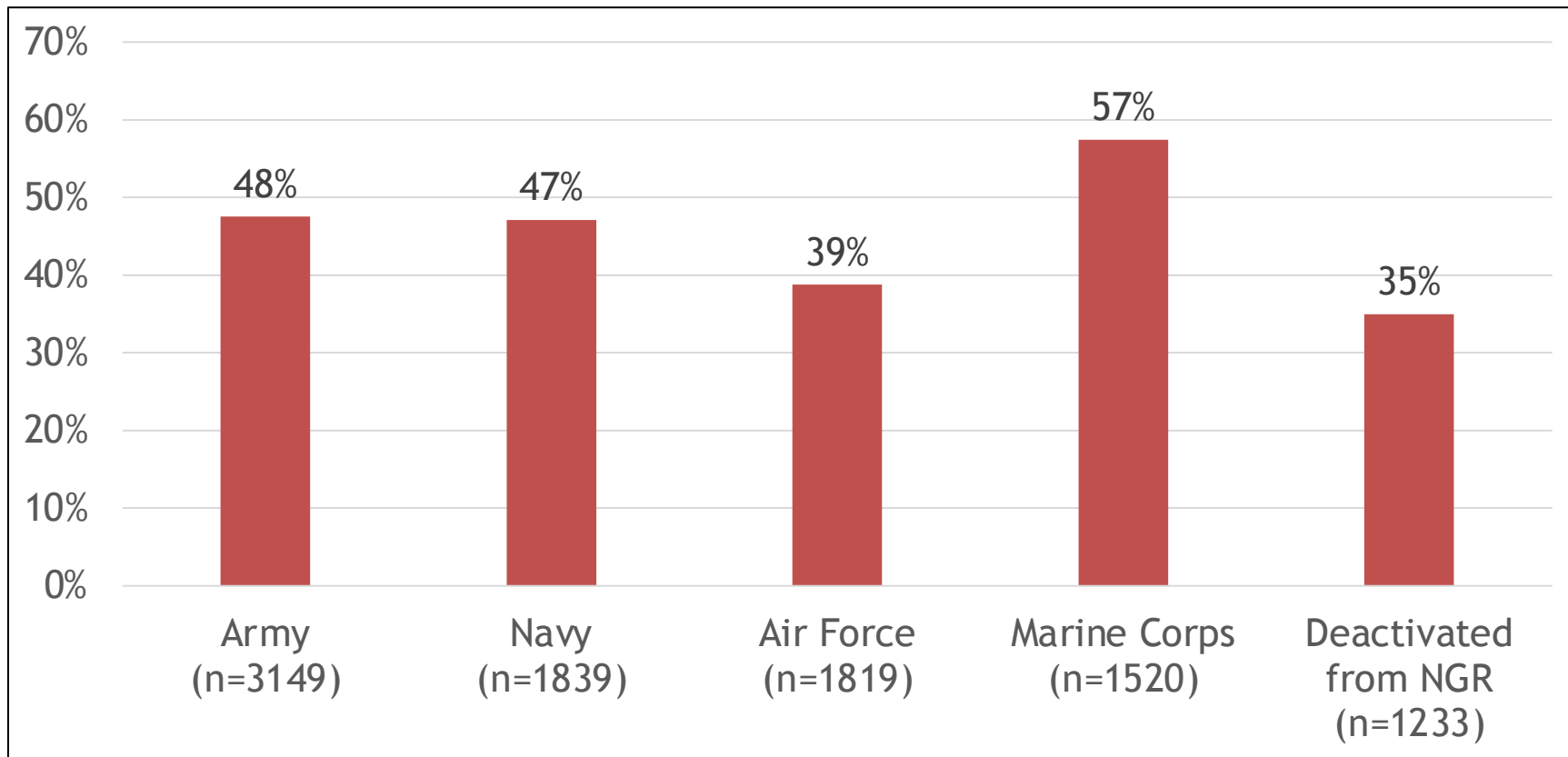
Higher Education Attendance by Gender



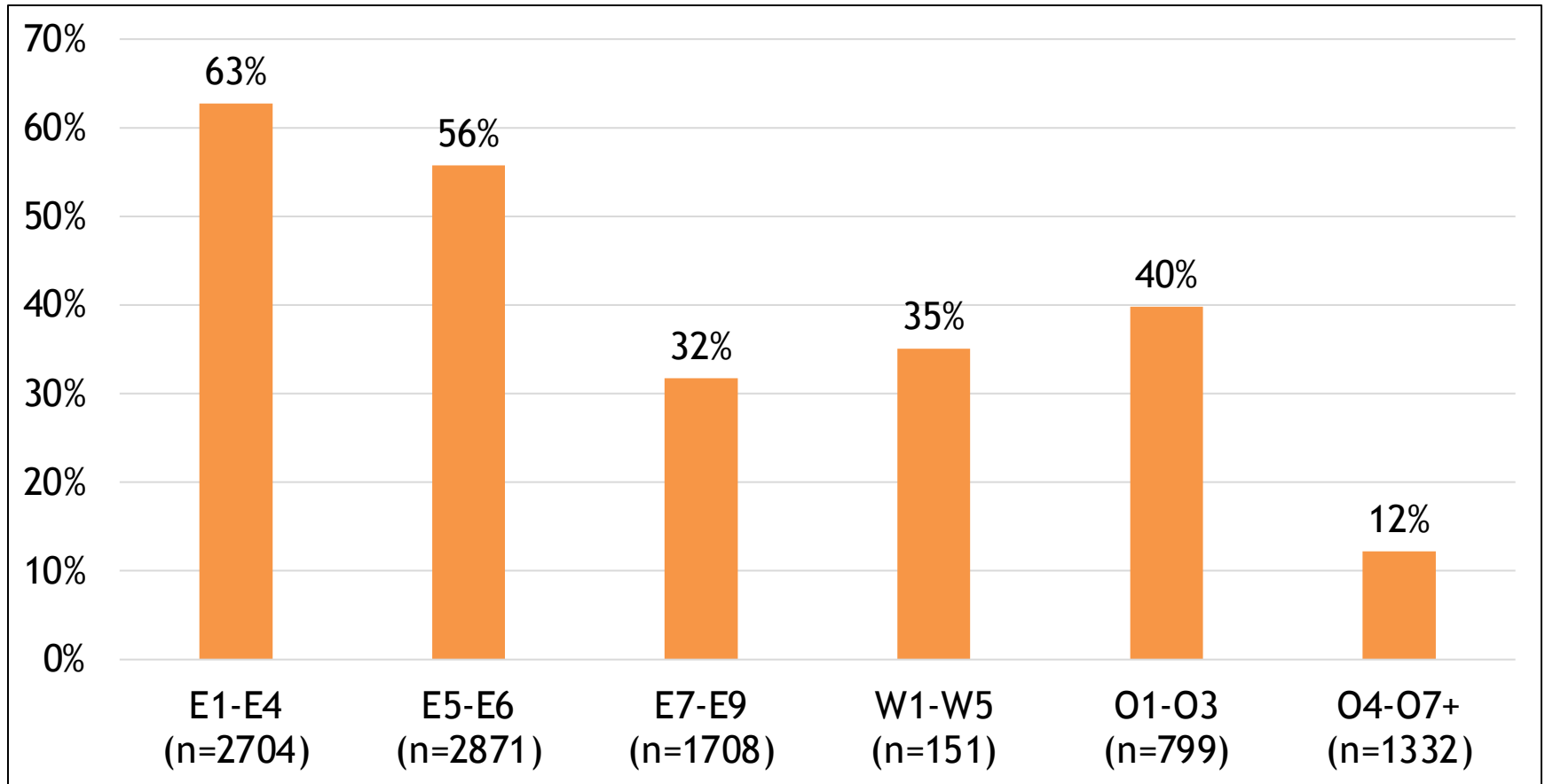
Higher Education Attendance by Race/Ethnicity



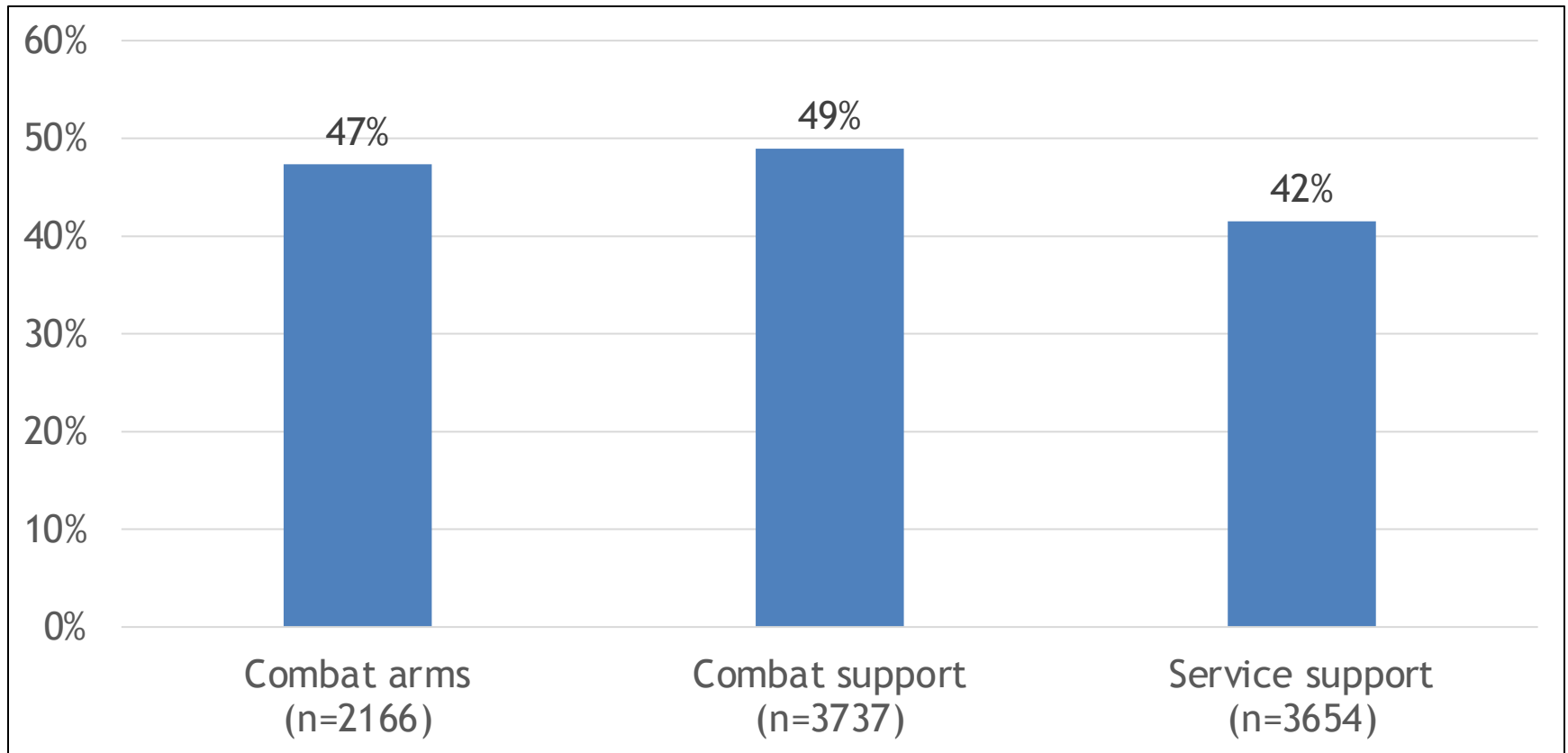
Higher Education Attendance by Service Branch



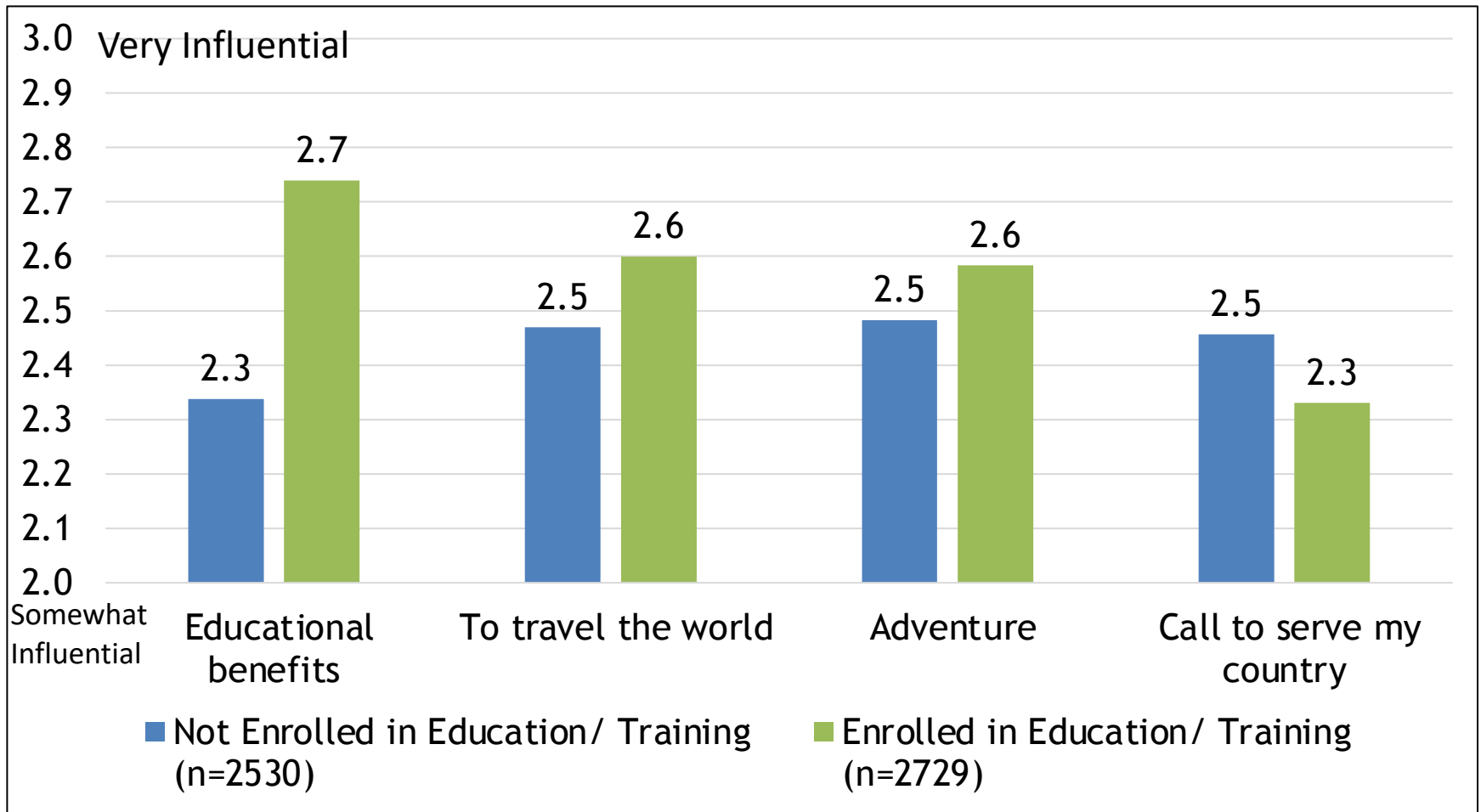
Higher Education Attendance by Paygrade



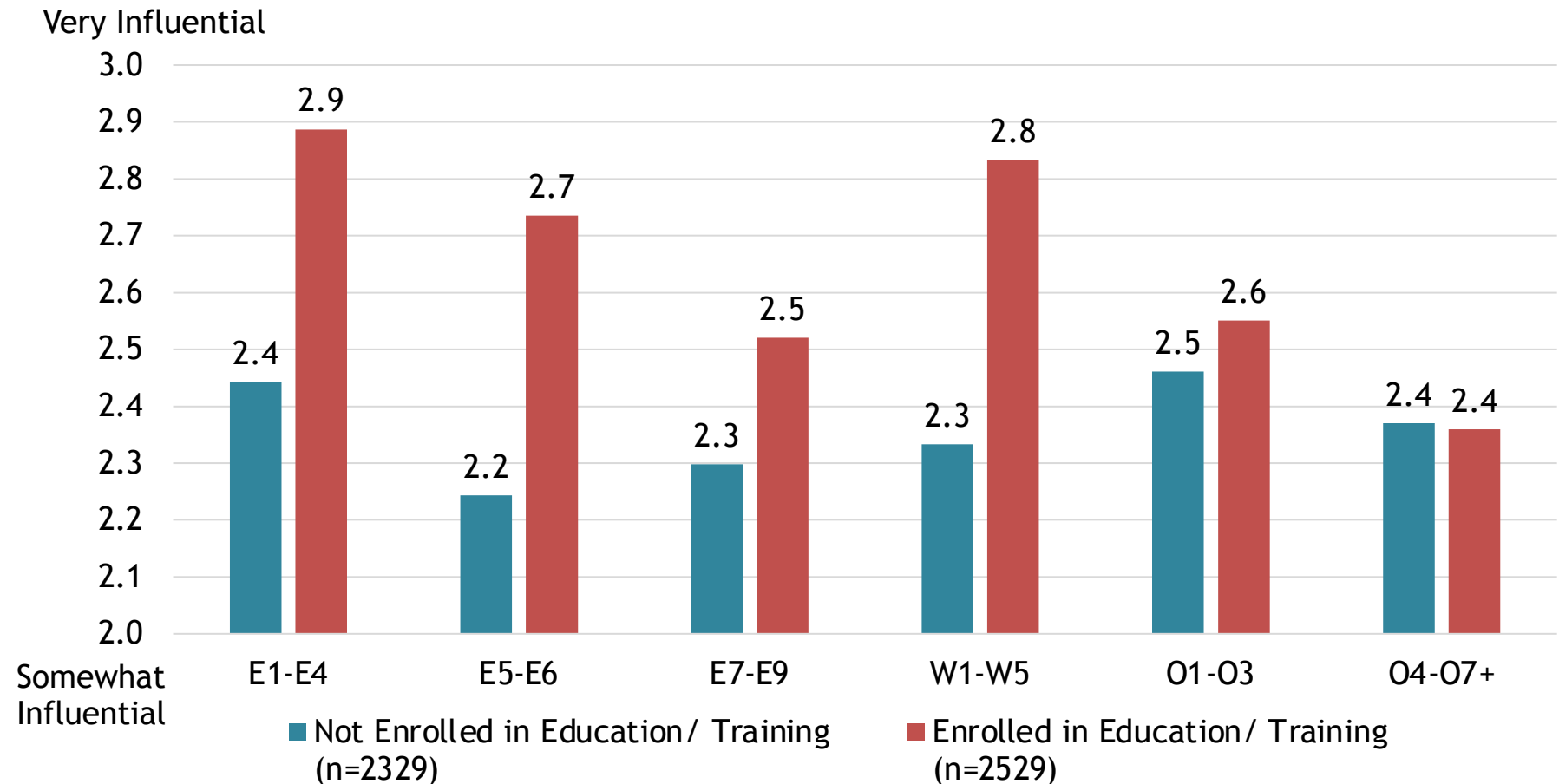
Higher Education Attendance by Military Occupation

Reasons Veterans Joined the Military - Educational Benefits by Paygrade

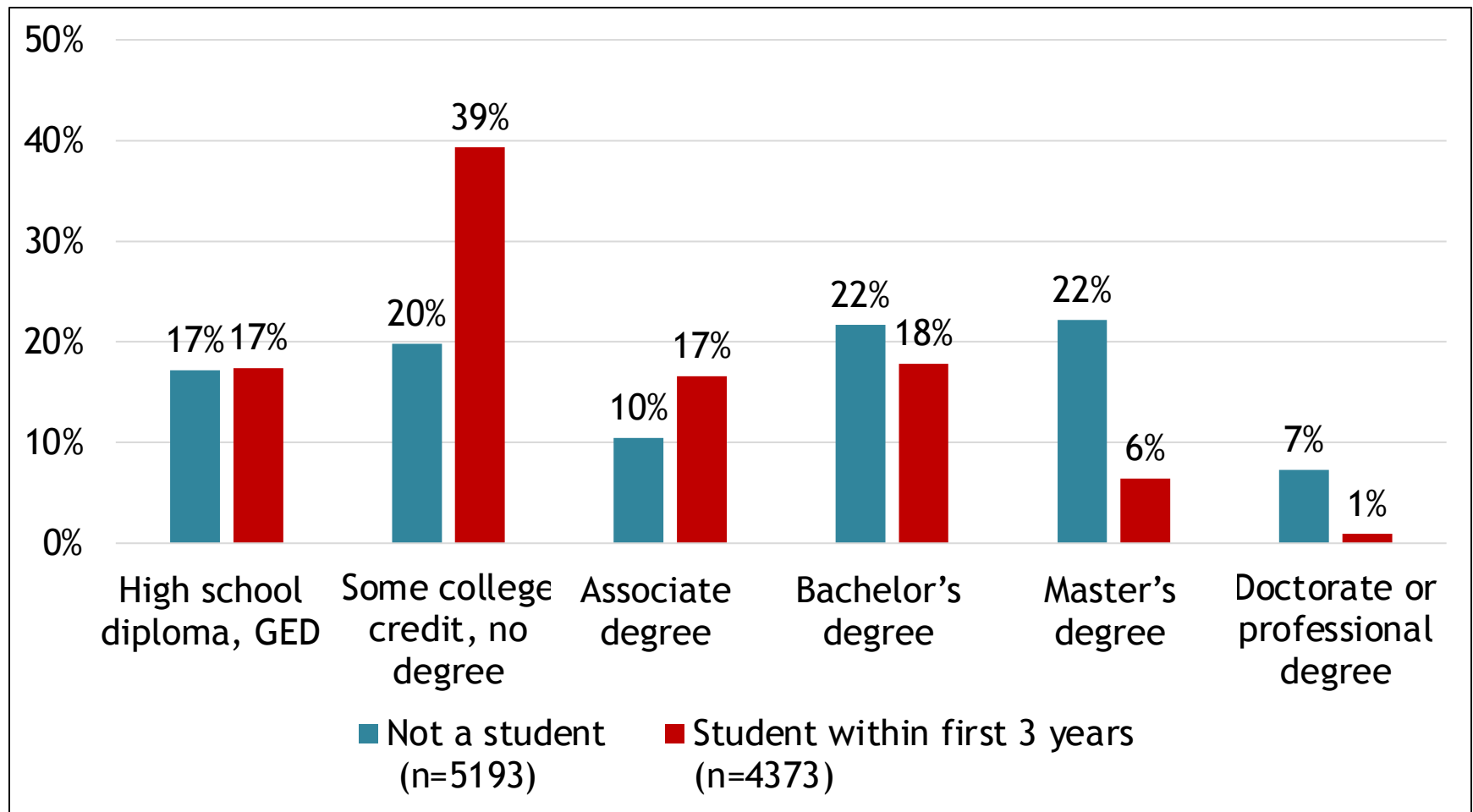


Additional Covariates Predicting School Attendance

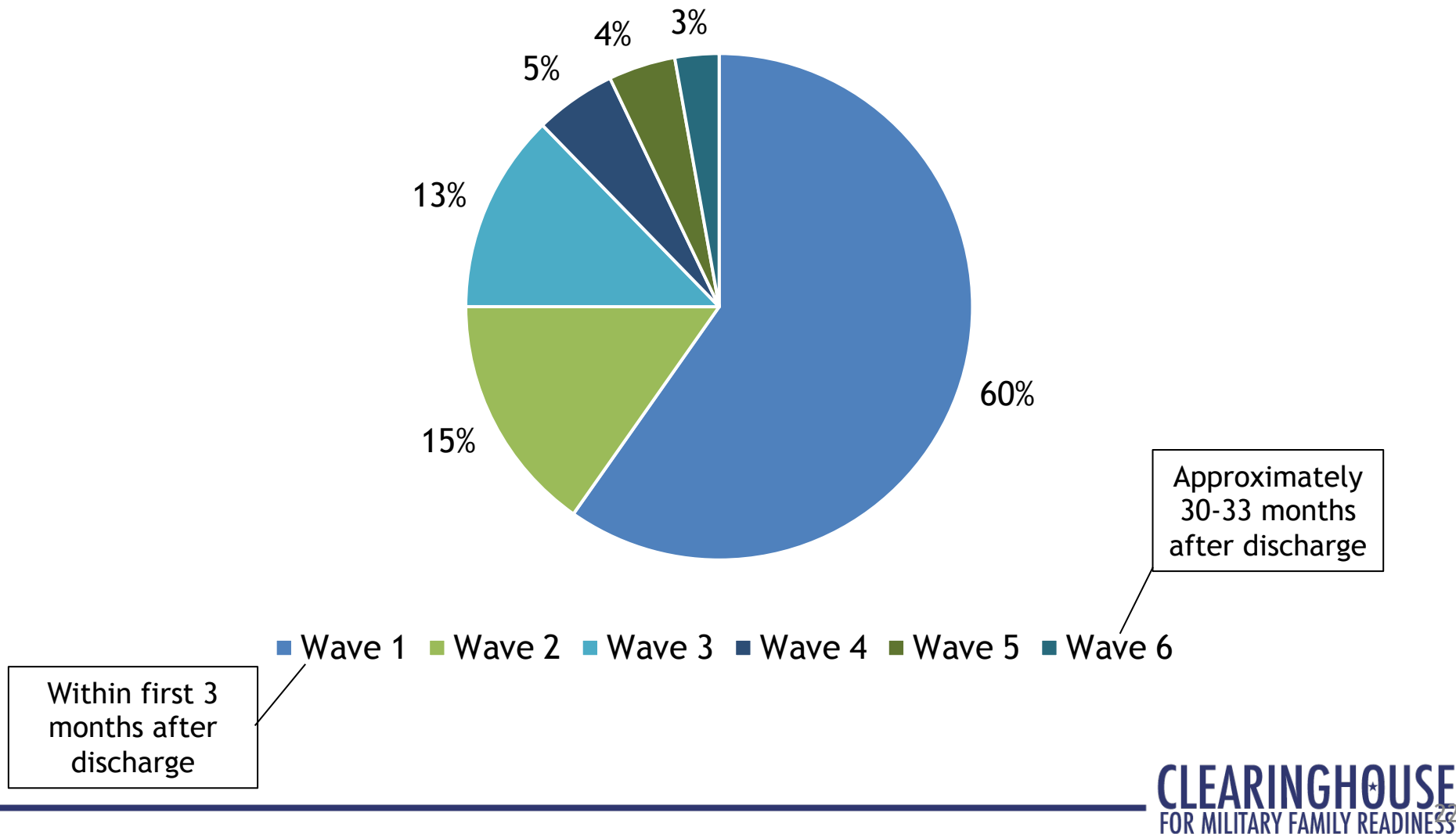
- Less likely to attend school or training
 - Males
 - E5 to E6 vs. E1 to E4
 - E7 to E9 vs. E1 to E4
 - O1 to O3 vs. E1 to E4
 - General or other discharge (honorable discharge)
- More likely to attend
 - Single
 - Veterans with PTSD symptoms
 - Veterans with anxiety symptoms



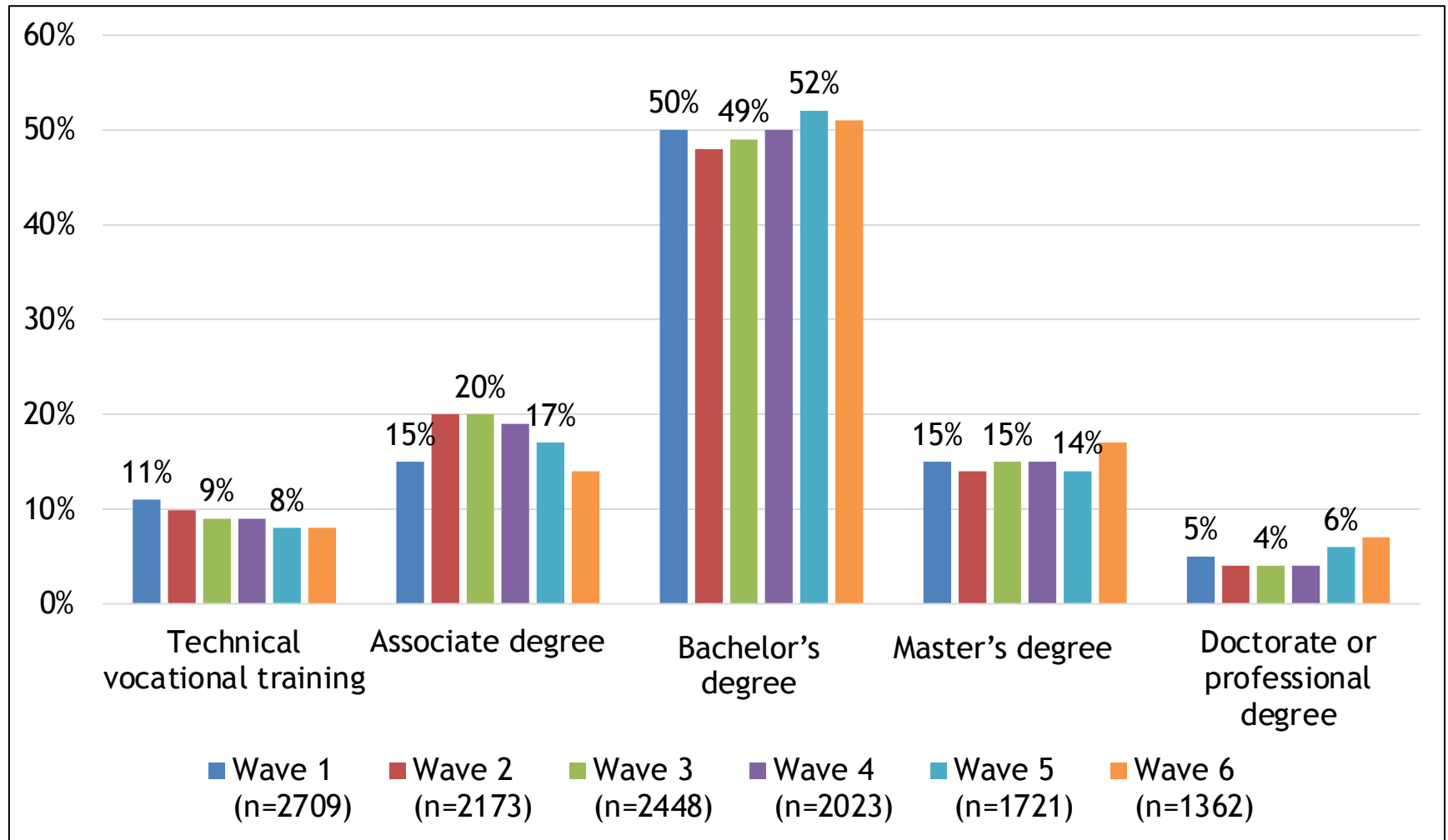
Background on Part-time or Full-time Students' Current Highest Level of Education

Primary Fields of Study

- 20% business
- 16% health science (nursing, health technology)
- 13% computer-related
- 9% engineering
- 8% social science (social work, psychology)

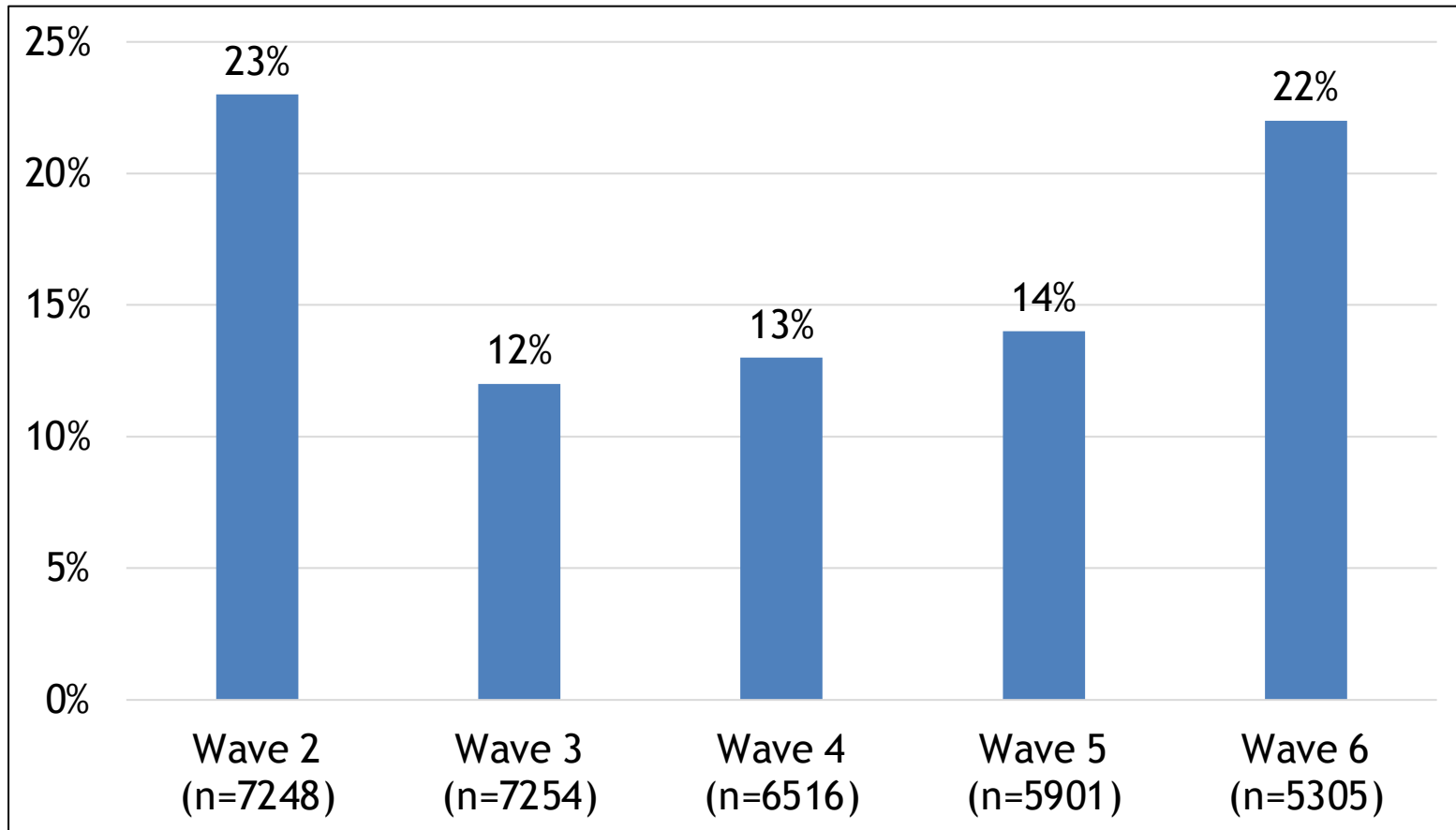

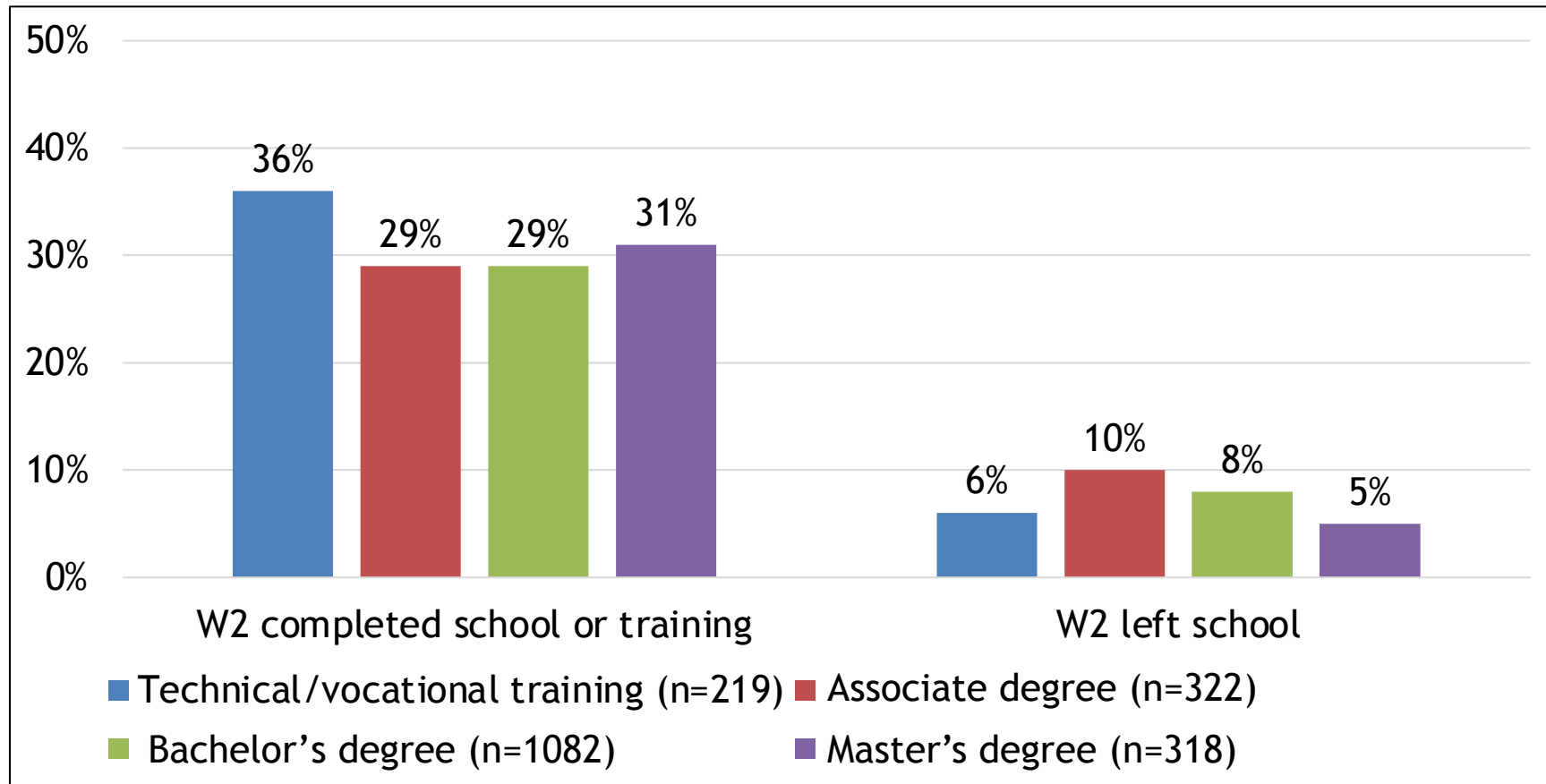
- 41% of Veterans completed their education within 3 years after discharge



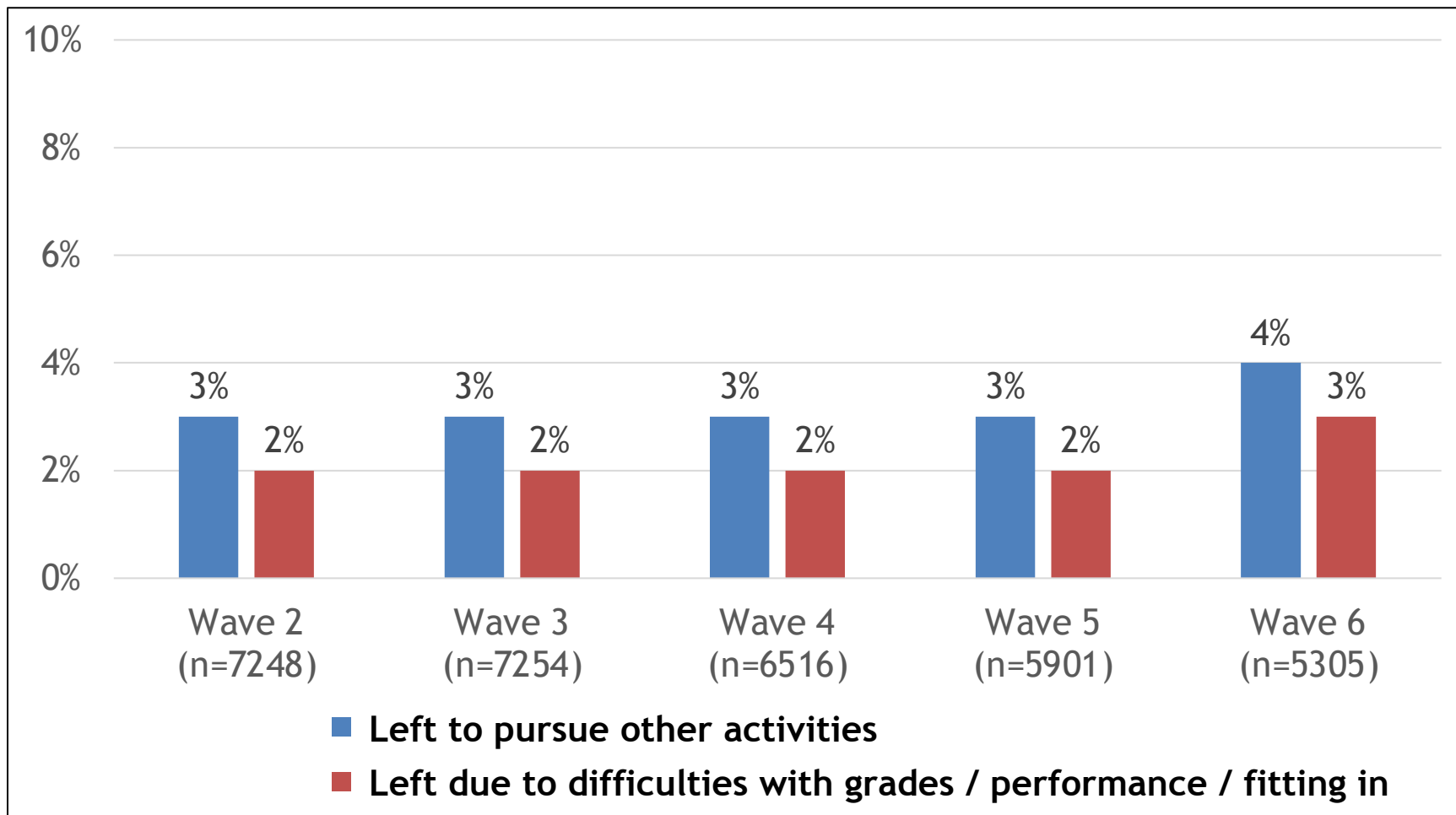
Education Completion by Wave



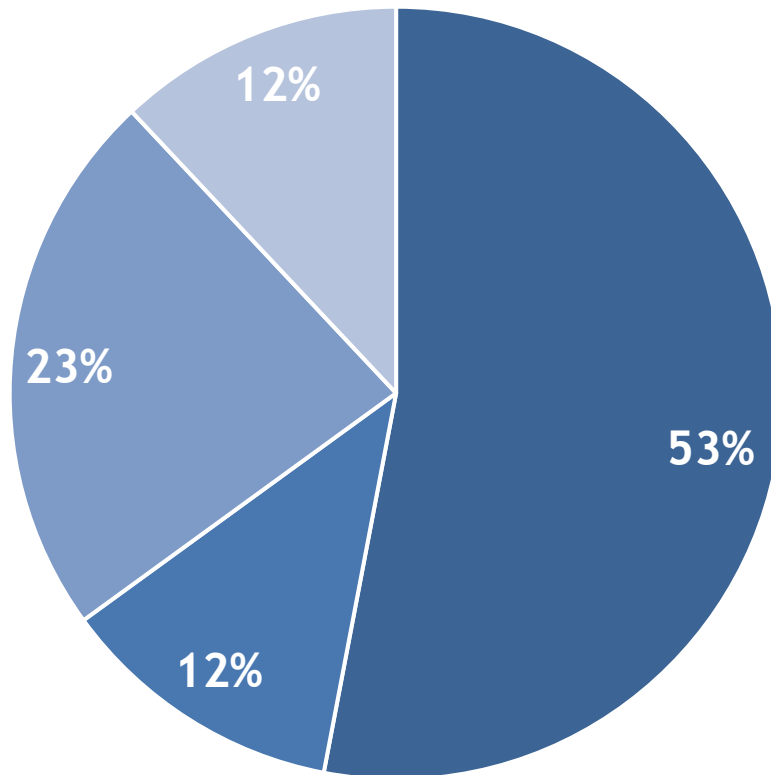
Education Completion or Withdrawal at Wave 2 by Degree Type



Percent Leaving Education by Wave

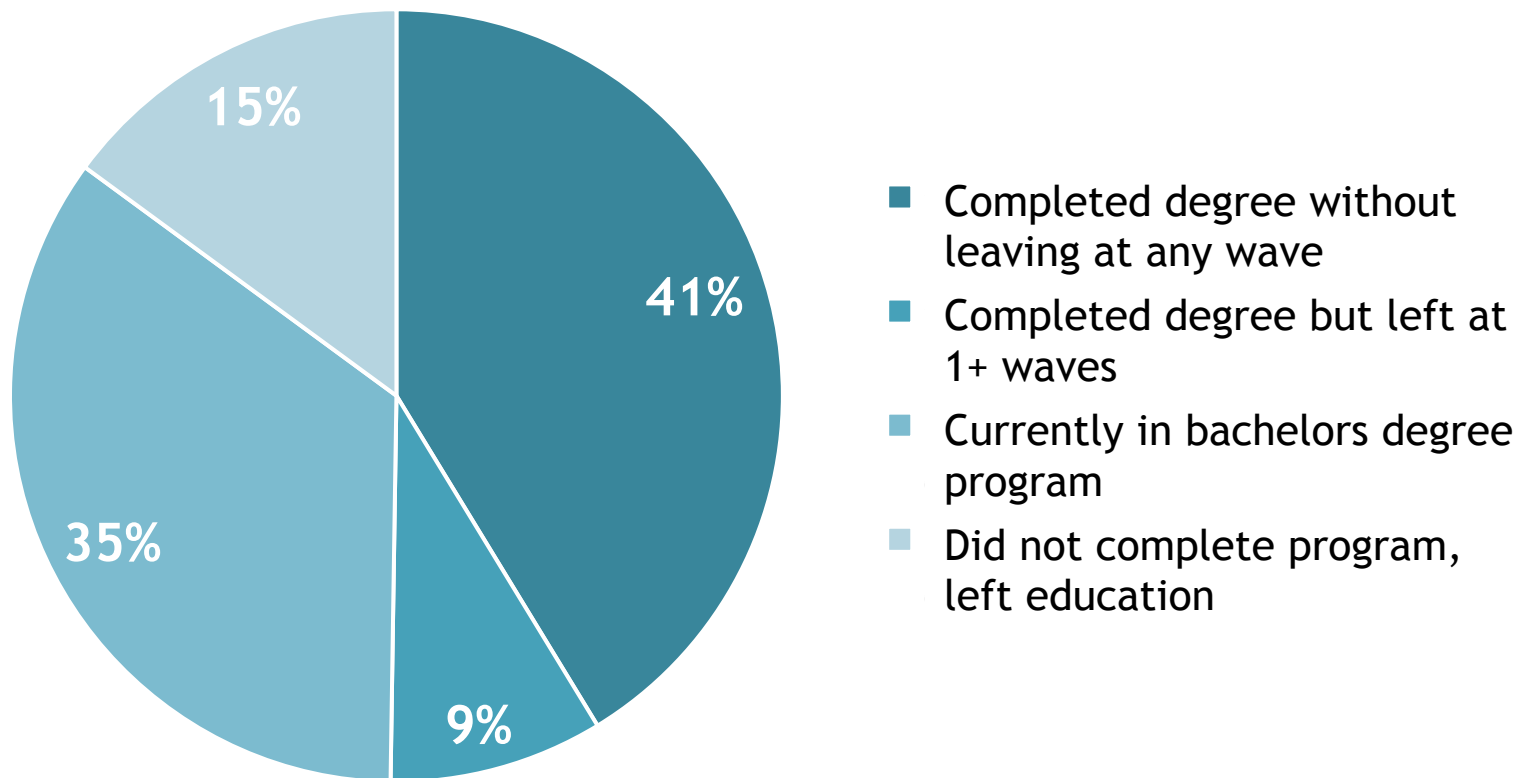


Education Completion or Withdrawal for Veterans in Technical Training Programs

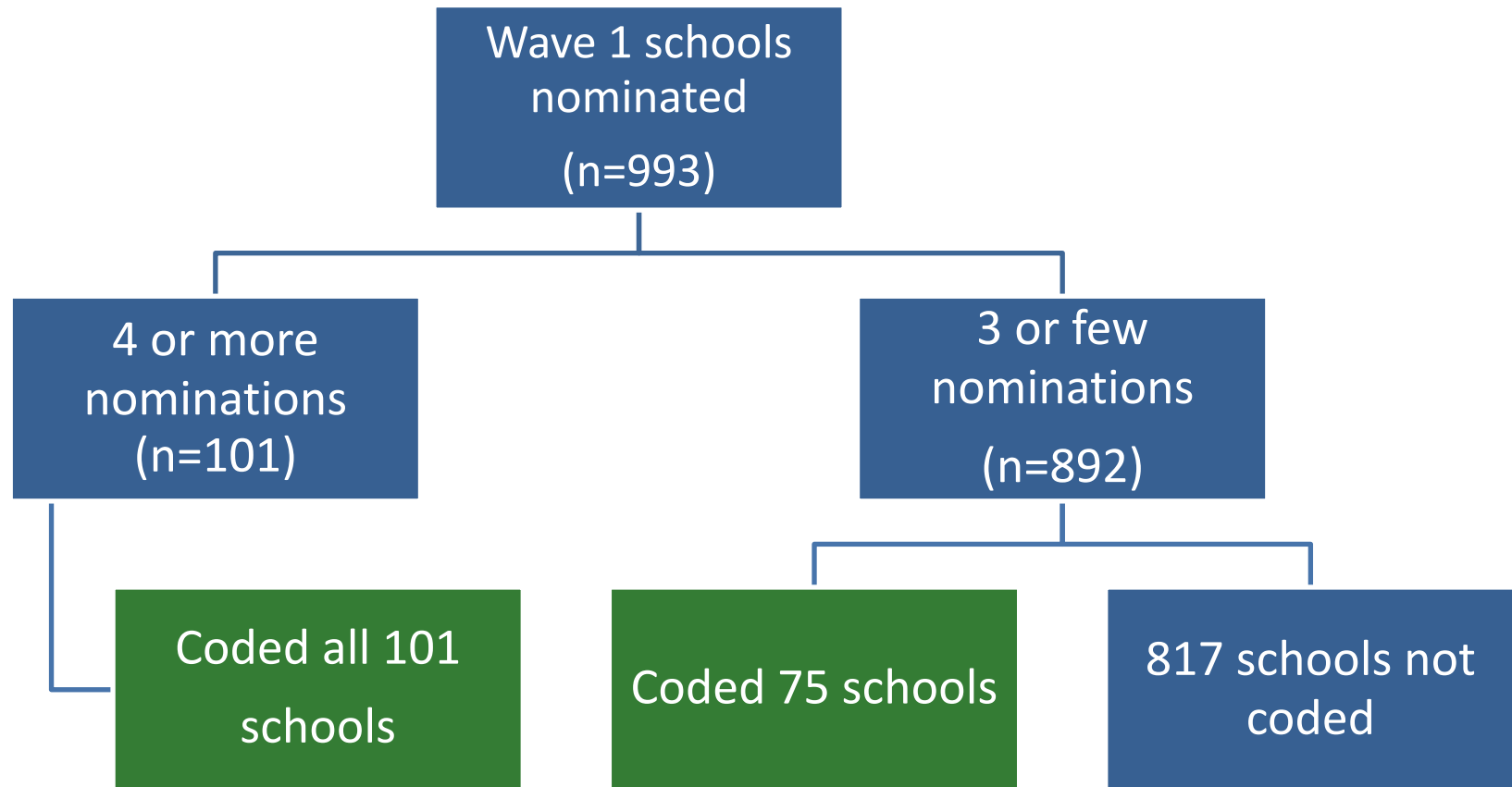

Common Components that Educational Institutions (n=219) Provide to Veterans

Program Components: technique, strategy, or feature used as part of a program

- **Content Components**
 - Coping skills; information on how to... write a resume, find a career, finance an education
- **Process Components**
 - Method of delivery
 - » Lecture (direct instruction), mentoring, rehearsal, peer-to-peer interaction, homework
 - Mode of delivery
 - » Online, phone, and face-to-face
- **Barrier reduction**
 - Providing monetary or tangible support, providing transportation, reducing stigma

Background on Education Institutions



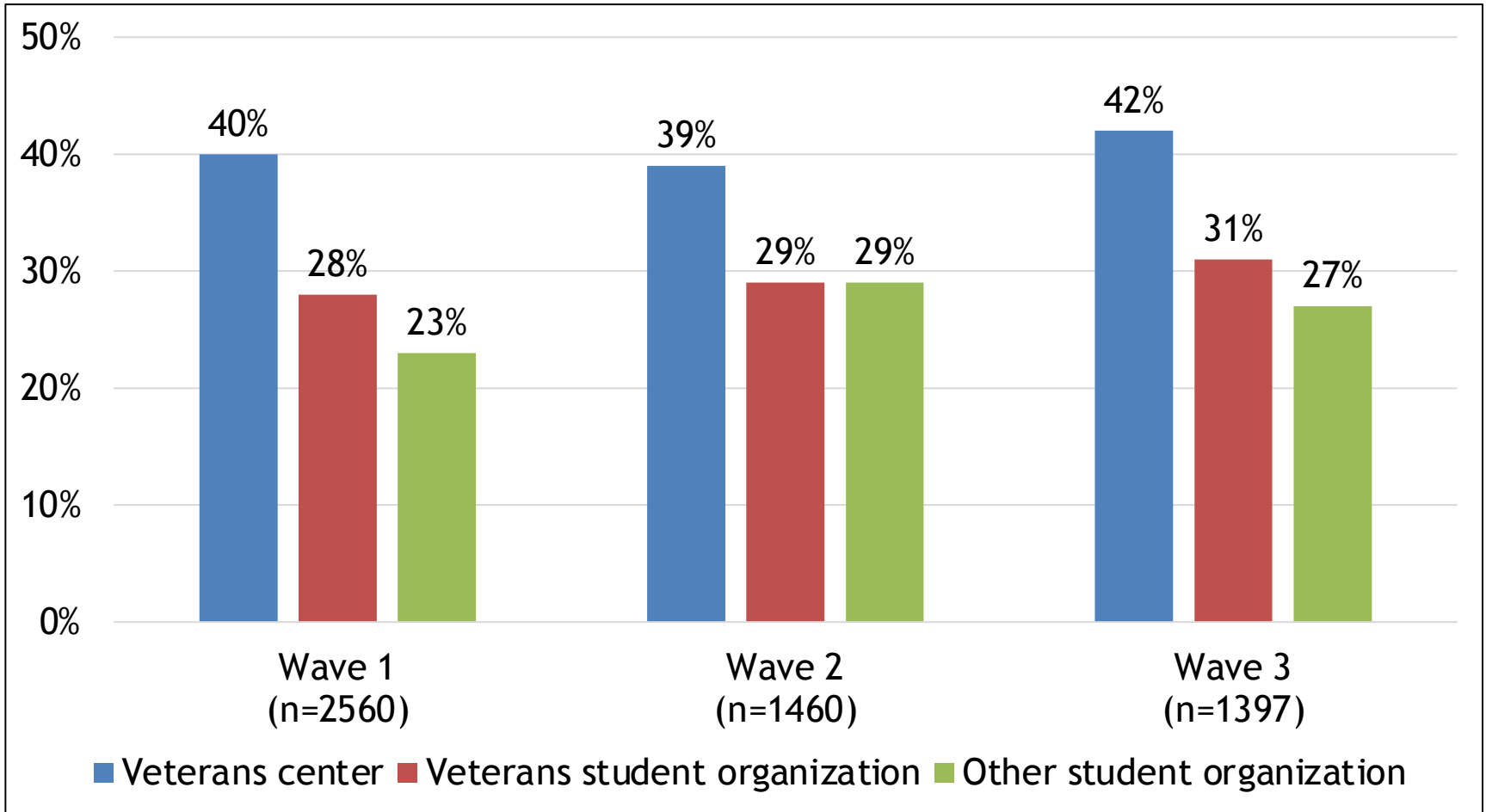
- Each wave had the same criteria for coding. Across all 6 waves, there were a total of 219 school coded with 4 or more nominations.
- 44% of the schools Veterans attended were coded.

Background on Coded Schools

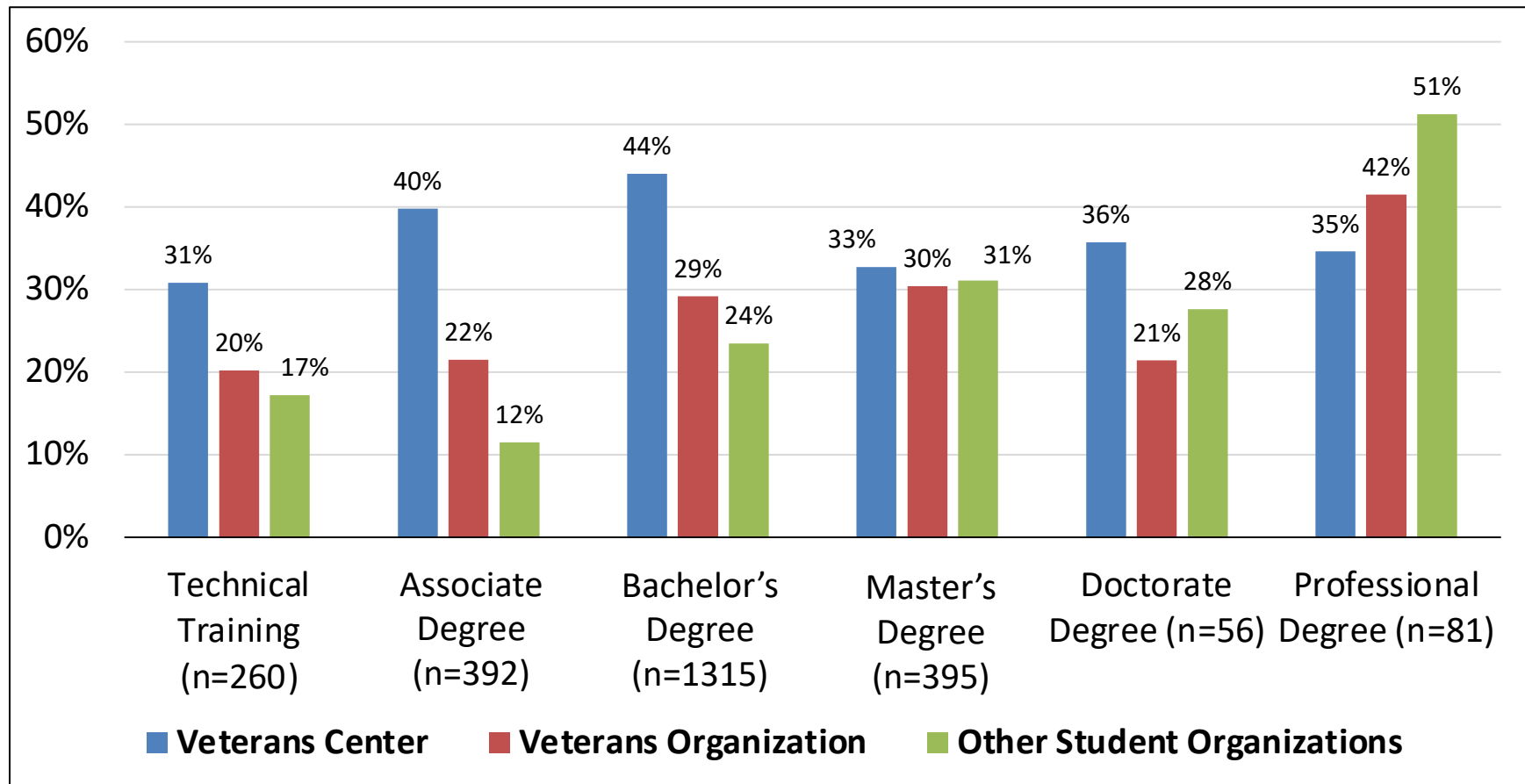
- Online only (7%; n=18)
- Average student population (n=23,564)
 - Median (n=19,775)
 - Range 883 to 84,289
- Type
 - Public (56%)
 - Private, for-profit (5%)
 - Private, not-for-profit (11%)



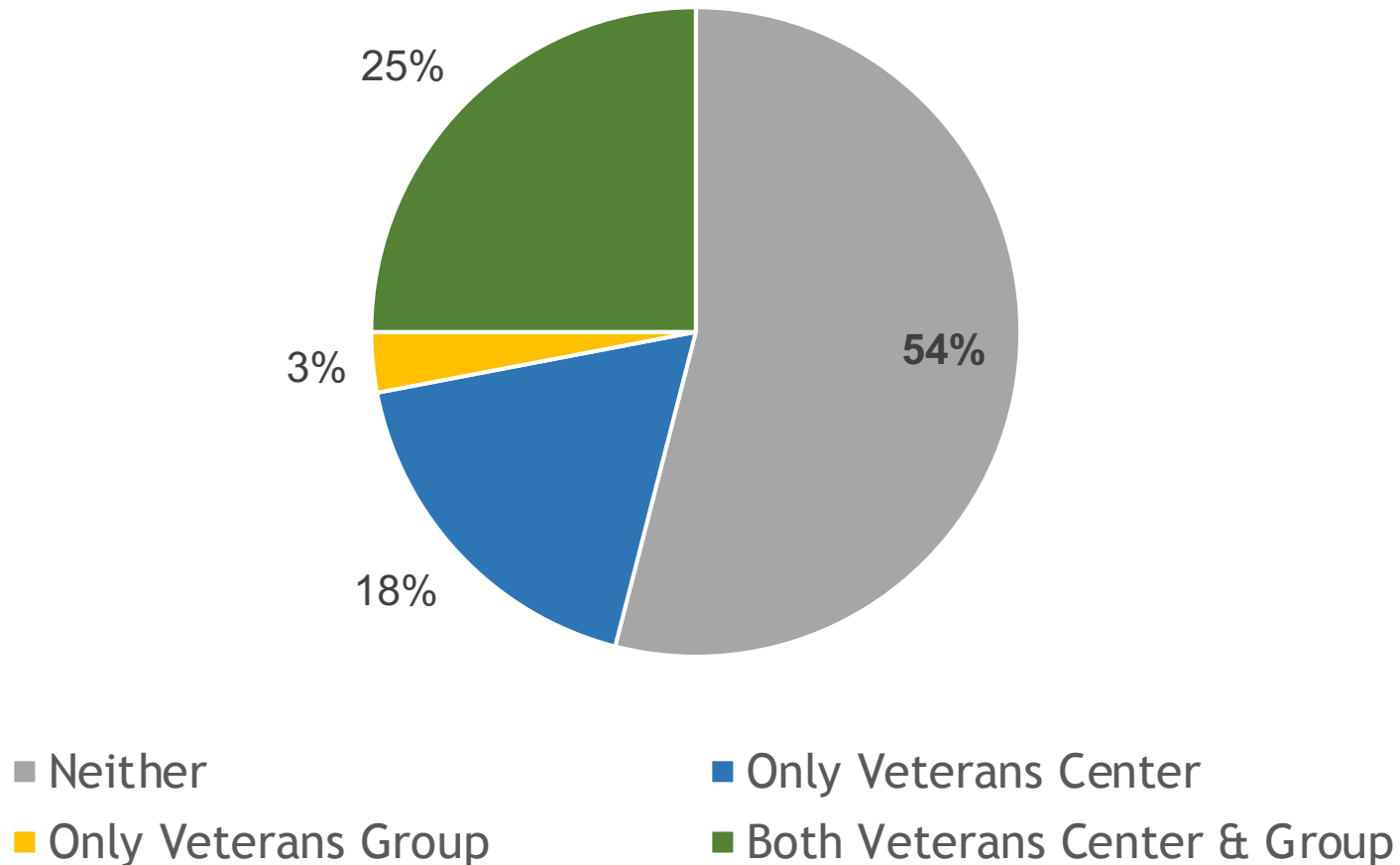
Education Components by Wave



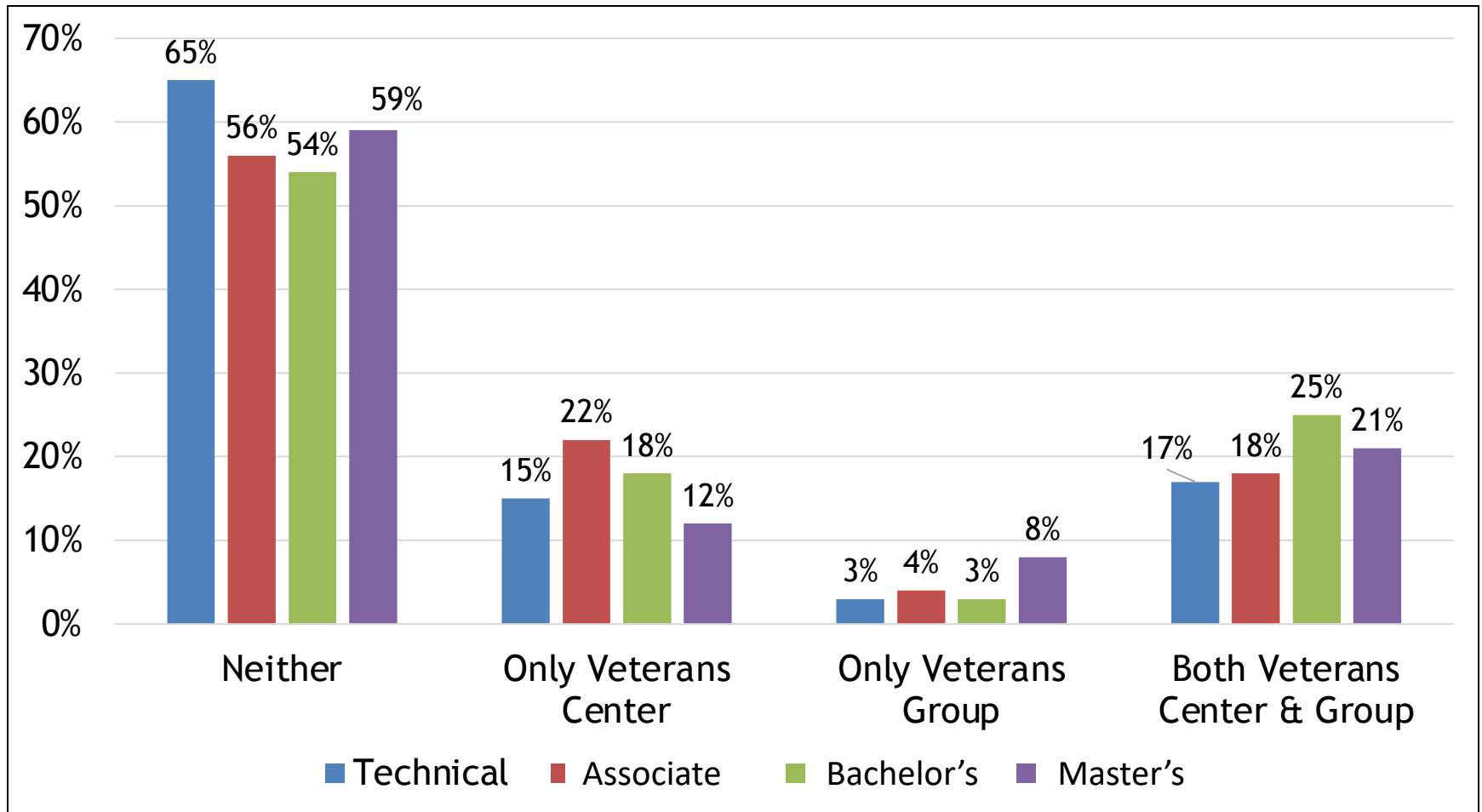
Education Components by Degree Type in Wave 1

Component Use by Degree Program



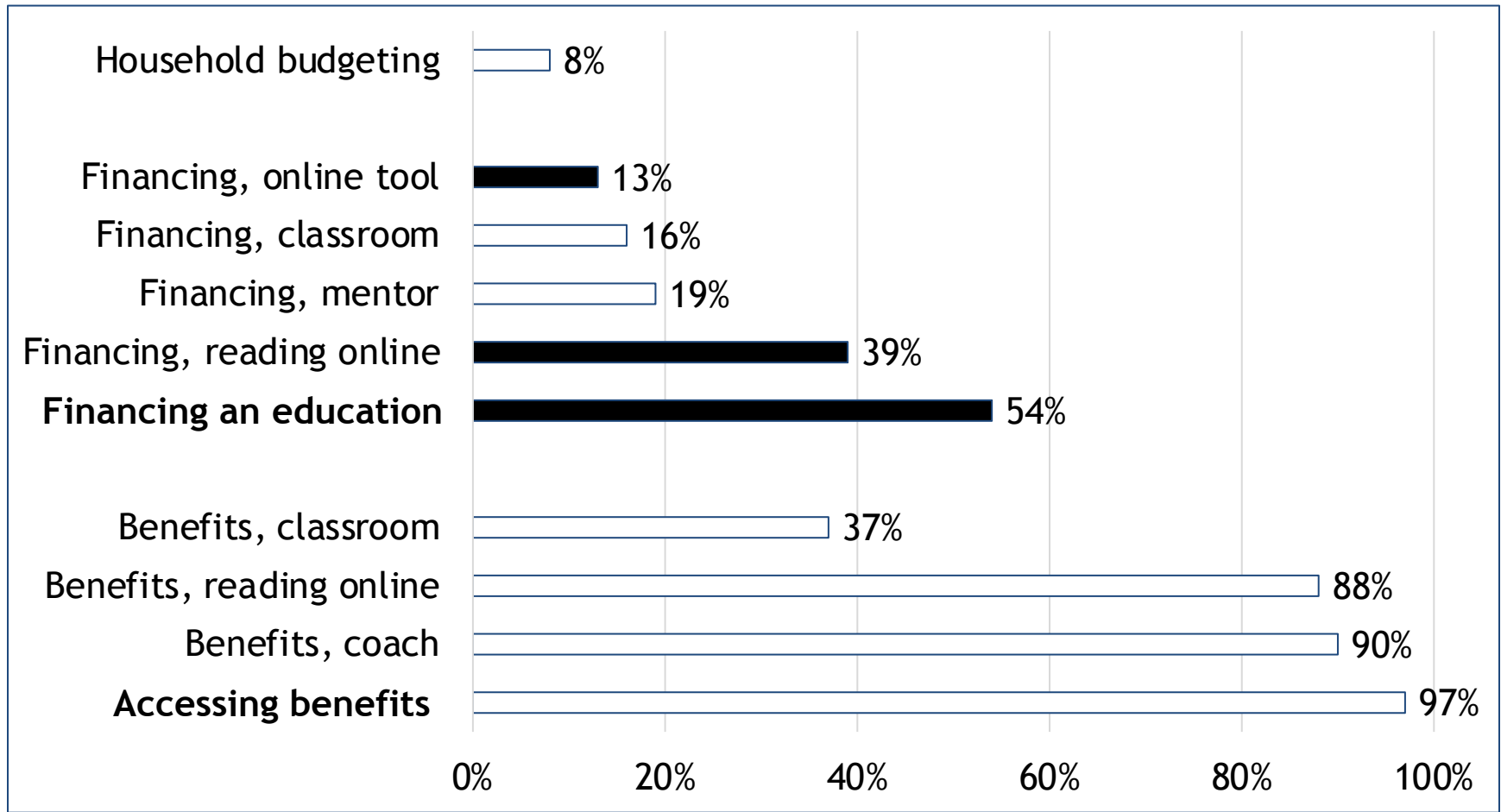

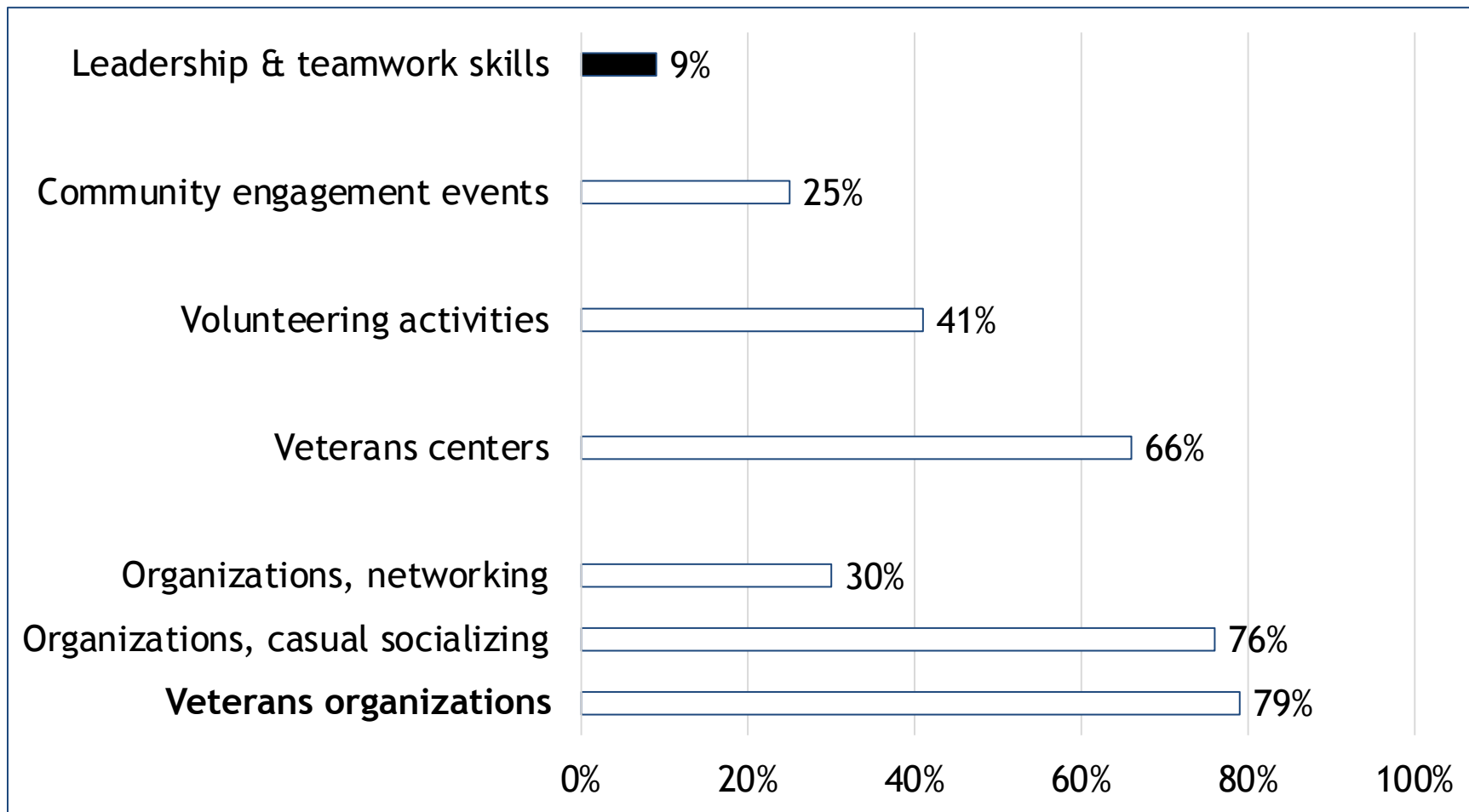

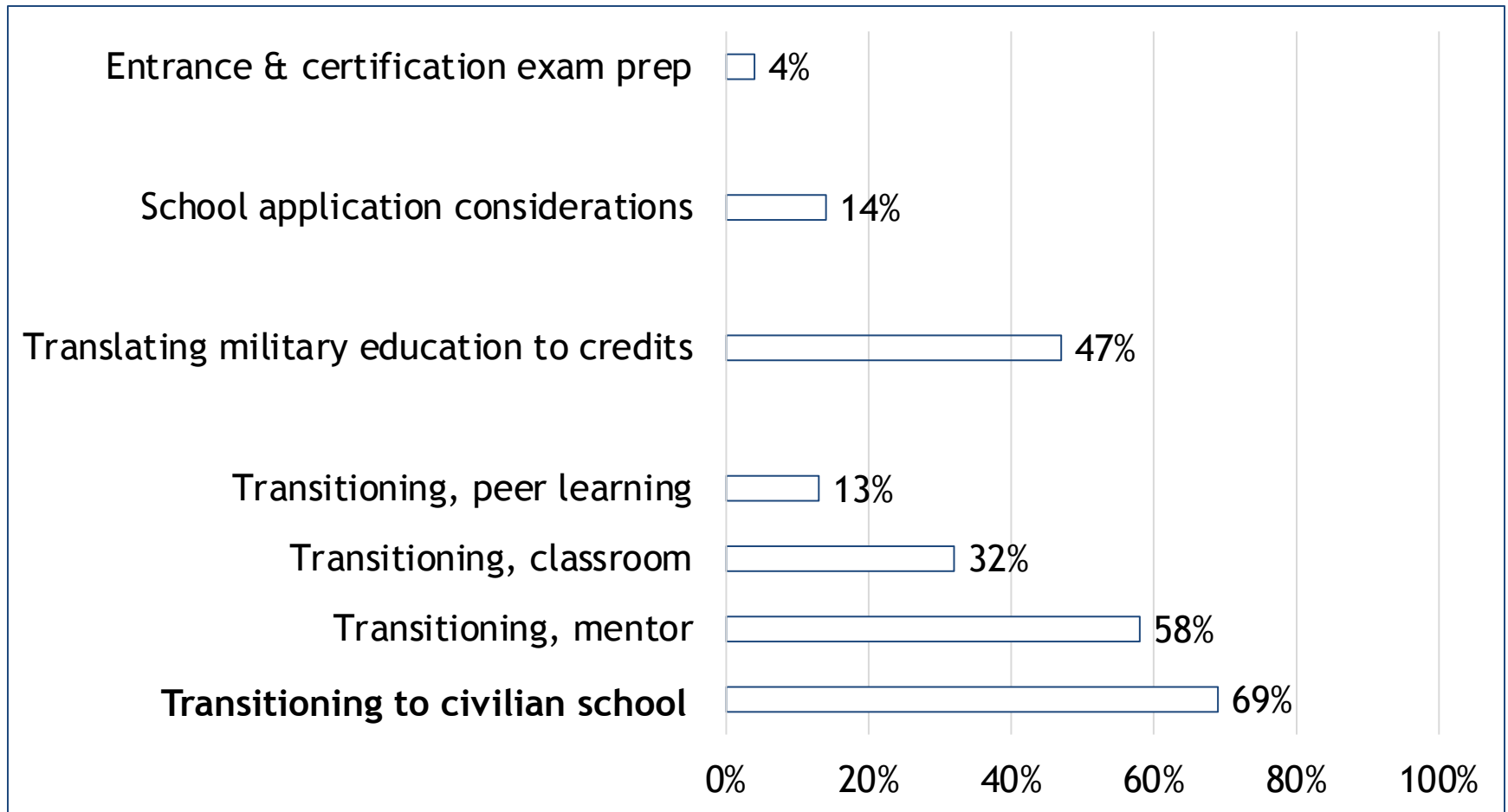
Common components in the financial domain related to education completion by Wave 5



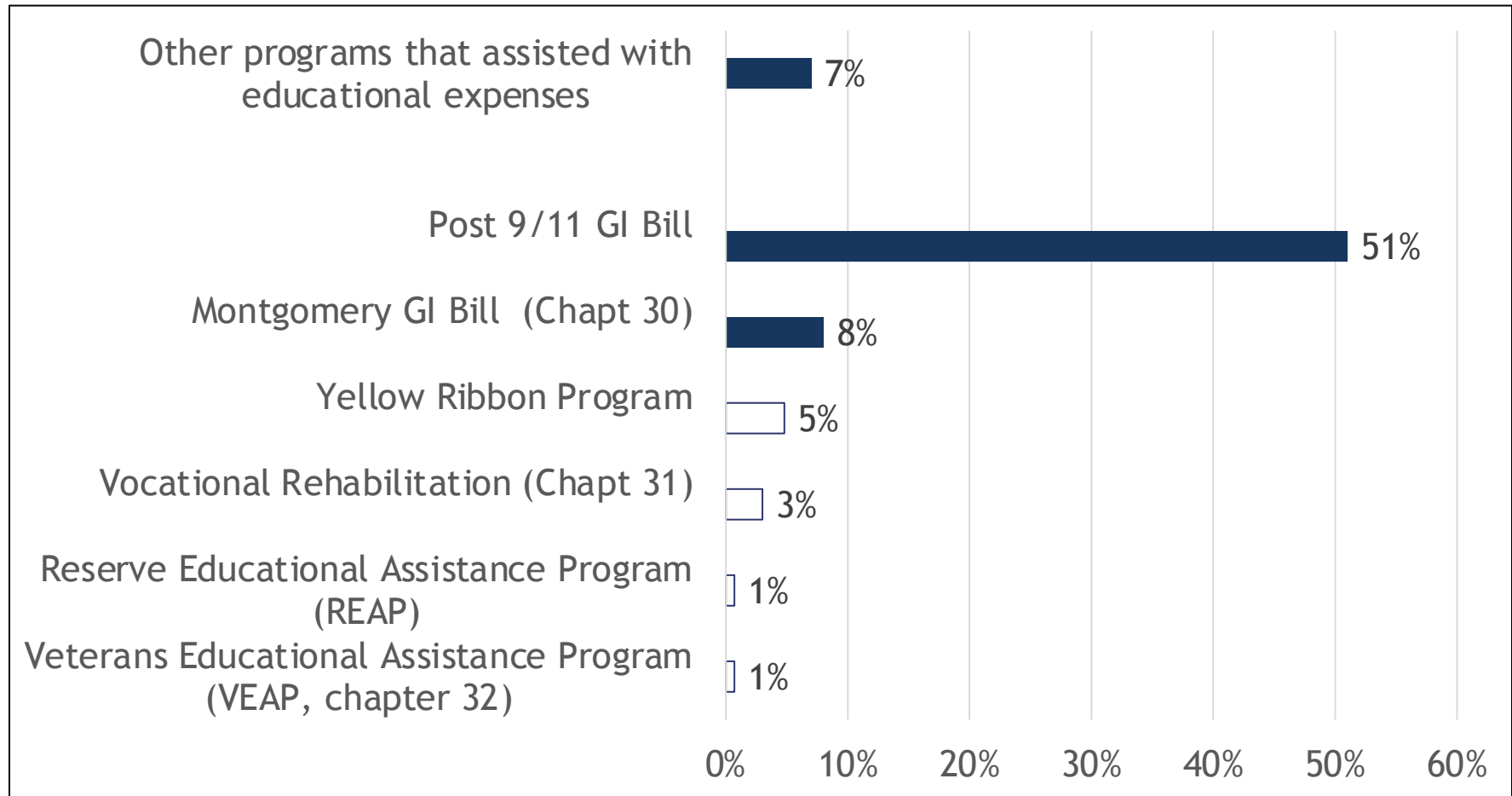
Common components in the social domain related to education completion by Wave 5

Education Common Components that Improve Mental Health & Decrease Social Isolation

Correlates of Social Isolation

- Veterans with these attributes were more likely to be socially isolated at Wave 1:
 - Problematic financial status
 - Traumatic brain injury
 - PTSD symptoms
 - Probable depression



Social Isolation and Program Components

- Veterans who were socially isolated at Wave 1 but visited a Veterans center at their school, at Wave 1, were less likely to feel socially isolated at Wave 2.



Social Isolation and Program Components

- Veterans who were socially isolated at Wave 1 but participated in a religious or spiritual community at Wave 2 were less likely to feel socially isolated at Wave 2.



Social Isolation and Program Components

- Veterans who were socially isolated at Wave 1 but reported volunteering at Wave 2 were less likely to feel socially isolated at Wave 2.



Social Isolation and Program Components

- Veterans who were socially isolated at Wave 1 but reported regularly participating in a community group that shares similar hobbies at Wave 2 were less likely to feel socially isolated at Wave 2.



Discussion

- School administrators should:
 - Recruit students early, before separation
 - Educate Veterans on financial budgeting (outside of paying for education)
 - Improve access to PTSD treatment
- Veterans should:
 - Plan early for college finances and debt
 - Choose schools with student groups
 - Get involved



Future Directions

- Longitudinally, do changes in PTSD symptoms improve educational outcomes?
- Deeper dive into what the Veterans centers are doing, particularly at technical schools
- Investigate how these educational components relate to employment outcomes
- Long-term outcome tracking
